BRTC's 12th annual Holocaust Series, in partnership with the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, featured Hungarian Holocaust survivor Péter Görög.

Péter was born on March 10, 1941, in Budapest, Hungary. After his father died in a forced labor camp, Péter and his mother were forced from their home and eventually ended up in the Budapest ghetto. Péter grew up in communist Hungary and finally defected to the United States in 1980. He was a computer engineer and worked on several NASA programs including the Hubble space telescope. Péter retired in 2014 at the age of 73 and volunteers at

the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum where he is able to share his family's story with visi-

tors. Péter told his story to almost 1,400 visitors.





BAT Mobile Grant Renewed

For the 10th year, the Arkansas State Police's Highway Safety department has renewed the grant which supports BRTC Law Enforcement Academy's Breath Alcohol Testing (BAT) Mobile. It is the only completely self-contained vehicle used for conducting sobriety checkpoints in Arkansas.

Director Ashley Boles travels the state working with law enforcement agencies throughout Arkansas. He also gives tours and demonstrations to community organizations and schools. When you see Ashley, ask him what kindergartners expect when you say "BAT Mobile."

BRTC Adult Ed Students Earn \$8,000+

Forty-five Adult Ed students joined 40,000 students nationwide to participate in an assessment-based field study. Students took from 1 to 3 tests in reading, math, and language. For participating, students earned from \$50-\$260, depending on the level and number of tests taken. Altogether, they

took 111 tests and collectively earned \$8,465. The Adult Education Fund in the BRTC Foundation was awarded \$1,865 for their participation.

Adult Ed instructor Cindy Robinett said, "We've never been involved in anything like this before and it was a great experience for our students."

BRTC Wins \$1.18 Million TRIO Grant

BRTC has been awarded its first TRIO Educational Opportunity Center (EOC) grant from the U.S. Department of Education. It will serve students in Clay, Greene, Lawrence, and Randolph counties and assist veterans, military connected families, and ex-offenders.

"We are excited to make education more available to residents of our service area," stated Martha Nelson, VP of Student Affairs. "The EOC will help our adults with education that can change their lives and those of their families."
