We also had 16 4-star sponsors who provide a named scholarship to students: AgHeritage Farm



Holocaust Survivor Speaks to 1,471 Students, Visitors

BRTC's 13th annual Holocaust Series, in partnership with the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum (USHMM), featured Ukrainian Holocaust survivor Rita Rubinstein. Rita was born on December 12, 1936, in Văscăuti, Romania, now Vashkivtsi, Ukraine. In 1940, the Soviet army marched into Văscăuti and drafted her father; later, Romanian soldiers forced out all its Jews. Rita's family bribed a guard to take them to a primitive village where they lived for 3 years before being moved to a displaced persons camp. At the age of 12 she arrived in the United States. Rita, a retired 3rd grade school teacher, volunteers at USHMM to share her story. At BRTC, Rita spoke to 1,471 visitors over 2 days.
