Hunter came to BRTC in Pocal In February 2019, 19-year-old Hunter Medlock left Arlington, Kentucky, and moved to Ravenden to be with his grandparents. Right away, Hunter came to BRTC in Pocahontas and visited the Adult Education department and immediately began his GED and looking for a job.

Hunter was introduced to Mike Willyerd of the Arkansas Workforce Center in Paragould and was encouraged to apply for the WIOA Youth Services job program. After a successful interview, Hunter began working through the Arkansas Workforce Center for the City of Pocahontas at the Sports Complex. He also attended morning GED classes at BRTC.

Hunter finished his GED in April 2018 and was then able to go to work fulltime at the Sports Complex. "Here's a great kid who should go far in life," said Hunter's GED teacher, Cindy Robinett. "Being able to watch him succeed is one reason I love my job."

With tuition assistance from the Arkansas Workforce Center, Hunter began college classes at BRTC in Fall 2018. He is currently enrolled in the Auto Collision Repair program with Butch Dail. He continues to work for the City of Pocahontas after school, working as many hours as he can. "Hunter is an outstanding student," said Instructor Butch Dail. "He's here very early for class and has never missed. He's very dedicated and eager to learn. I can show him something one time and he knows how to do it."

Robinett said today many young people need more mentoring than they used to: "We often see kids who don't realize how important a good work ethic is, how important first impressions are, and how priceless an education is." Hunter demonstrates this ethic. "Not only is Hunter a hard worker," Dail said, "but he's always looking for extra work if his hours are low with the City. He doesn't like to sit still, so he's always busy." Both Robinett and Dail agree: students like Hunter make teaching a joy.

Dietary Manager's Program Now Available 100% Online!

To address the projected demand for dietary managers, BRTC is offering its 1-year technical certificate in Nutrition and Foodservice Management completely online. The dietary managers program is accredited by the Association of Nutrition and Foodservice Professionals. Because Arkansas will be changing the registered dietician program into a 4-year program instead of the past 2-year program, individuals interested in beginning a career in dietetics can use the dietary manager's program as a step into a 4-year program.

Graduates of the 1-year dietary manager's program can easily find employment at school and hospital cafeterias, in foodservice, and as assistants to registered dieticians at clinical sites. BRTC Adjunct Instructor Shares Love of Medieval Period with Walnut Ridge High School Seniors and Staff

On December 1, BRTC history adjunct instructor Roy Carroll (*standing*, *right*) shared his love of the Medieval period with more than 60 Walnut Ridge High School seniors and several faculty members in partnership with English teacher Tracy Hallman.

Students dressed up in Medieval garb and attended a Medieval feast. During the feast, students performed a boast which they had written. The feast is part of a unit on the Medieval period during which students study important Medieval works such as *Beowulf* and *Canterbury Tales*.

Carroll, a member of Society Creative Anachronism (SCA) which is the United States' largest Medieval organization, brings several pieces of his Medieval jewelry, clothing, and armor reproductions for students to view. He also shares information about living in the Medieval period and helps students understand the Medieval social structure including the nobility, church, and peasants. He also teaches about Medieval European warfare.

INSIGHT With Dr. Jan Ziegler

I am writing this message at the conclusion of a trip. This is not just any old trip, and it certainly is not a vacation. Today is a long anticipated trip to Chicago with a team of three others from BRTC to attend a special hearing meeting with the Higher Learning Commission.

The purpose of the hearing: a committee of our peers met with us to consider and recommend our accreditation status going forward. This committee of six will be making its recommendation to the HLC Board by the end of December. Their recommendation to remove our current probation status and place us on the "Standard Pathway" is the outcome we at BRTC hope to and believe we should receive. The decision will be announced around March 1.



BLACK RIVER TECH The entire college community has worked extremely hard since BRTC was placed on probationary status over one and one-half years ago. Our shortcomings, primarily in assessment of student learning, in strategic planning, and in lack of shared governance, did not mean that students at

)ur successand yoursis at the center of all we do."

BRTC were not receiving a good education nor that they were not mastering marketable skills and earning valuable credentials and degrees. Our identified shortfalls suggested that BRTC was failing to engage in data-driven decision making; we were failing to pursue continuous improvement.

We were doing a good job, but we were not always focused and intentional in the pursuit of excellence. During
